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<u>Letter From the President</u>

The Ecumenical Community Center continues to grow and change. The <u>Helping Hands Ministry</u> program is making changes to help ensure emergency funds are available throughout the month. Meeting increased requests for help is currently difficult for all groups that rely on donations. <u>The economy has reduced donations</u> <u>but greatly increased requests for help.</u> The Helping Hands staff checks to see if other programs or resources are available as well. When no other help can be found, Helping Hands staff can provide emergency financial aid for rent and utilities.

<u>CompuPlace</u> continues a program of computer access that is both successful and unique. Focusing on adults living with disabilities, CompuPlace provides specially designed computer software and assistive devices to provide opportunities for learning, entertainment and creativity.

The Ecumenical Center continues to offer <u>low-cost office space to</u> several non-profit programs. This program helps <u>Green Square</u> <u>Meals and the Witwer Senior Center</u> to provide hundreds of meals each week to area residents. The <u>Foman Infant Center</u> is able to provide infant nursing care from the University of Iowa to qualifying residents in the Cedar Rapids area. The <u>Tapestry</u> <u>Program</u> is a growing exchange program that allows people to trade goods for services and vice versa when cash is limited. The <u>C.R.</u> <u>Aquatics Association</u> is highlighted in this issue of The Echo.

It should be noted that <u>Margaret Bock Housing</u> continues to provide low-cost, single room occupancy housing. This program, unique in Eastern Iowa, split off from the ECC in 2000. The housing program is at full capacity, thanks in large part to the excellent management of the Margaret Bock Board of Directors. Helping Hands staff provides applications and background checks.

As we enter the mid-year for 2012 I hope that you will continue to be part of the ECCF story. We must expand our programs to meet greatly increased needs. We need your financial support and donations of time more than ever. On behalf of the Ecumenical Center, thank you for your support. Someone in need can experience God's love through your contributions.

During the first four months of 2012, Helping Hands Ministry has provided:

Rent to 111 households (\$11,572.44)	Rent deposit to 5 households (\$550.00)
Electric to 49 households (\$5,522.38)	Gas to 7 households (\$617.78)
Water to 7 households (\$586.19)	Identification/Birth Cert for 5 HH (\$39.00)
Shelter Rent to 11 households (\$231.00)	Local Bus Tickets for 156 persons (\$400.00)

For a total of \$19,518.79 to 346 households (5 households received both service & bus tickets)

A "snippet" of a day at HHM...(the door opens at 10 a.m.) Waiting to be seen was a 34 year old single male staying at the Mission of Hope Shelter. He had questions on services available in the community. He had moved here from Des Moines four days ago and was actively seeking work as a CNA. He worked a few days for a local temporary service and earned \$263 which is not enough to move into his own apartment. Referrals were made to Linn County General Assistance for rent, to Margaret Bock Housing for possible single room occupancy living arrangements, to Department of Human Services for food and IowaWORKS to register for employment. He did not have a vehicle so HHM authorized six local bus tickets. An application for Margaret Bock Housing was given and received by HHM staff and he was linked with the building manager to view the rooms.

A total of six scheduled appointments were seen with services provided to five with rent (1 for \$100), electric (1 for \$126.32), electric deposit (1 for \$150); birth certificate (1 for \$24); and water (\$125). One applicant did not bring all the required documentation to her appointment and will return within two days to complete her request for rent. All were extremely appreciative of the help. Nine households came in for local bus tickets and were assisted by the office staff. One volunteer wrote "thank you" notes to churches that donated money in the past two weeks. One volunteer entered client data onto the Service Point database. A total of 64 incoming telephone calls were received. At 4 p.m. staff and volunteers were done for the day and the office closed.

<u>COMPUPLACE</u>: A Specialized Computer Learning Lab for People with Intellectual Disabilities and / or Needs for Assistive Technology


CompuPlace has recently been celebrating the successes of several new individuals. They are playing games, surfing the Internet, and improving typing, reading, and many other communication and problem-solving skills.

In the first quarter of 2012, 60 individuals received 155 client hours of service per month via 167 hours of paid staff time. Total client hours of service provided were 465 via 501.75 paid staff hours. \$2,126.75 was contributed directly to the CompuPlace program by clients, their family members and the community.

We need your help taking photos in the community. We have a list of "sight" words and other useful words and we need volunteer photographers to take pictures to go with these words. We will use the images to make games for our clients to improve word recognition and spelling. The nouns will be easier, and even very young photographers could help. 

Some clients even use a regular mouse with one hand to move the arrow and a track ball to click with the other hand to click. It is a real joy to step back and watch a person discover how well they can operate the computer!

Margaret Bock Housing Update



The management team at MBH is very busy as usual these days. We are reorganizing our responsibilities following the March passing of our president Hank Hernandez. Jim Federer has changed roles from secretary/treasurer to president. Tom Ryder continues as vice-president. Peggy Kuda is new to our board and is very qualified to be our treasurer. A relatively new board member, Amy Sigler, is our secretary. MBH has four other board members, and each of our eight members could be high-lighted in a future ECHO publication.

Our property manager, Mike Williams, maintains our occupancy rate at near 100% for our 34 individual rooms. There is a steady stream of applicants through ECC at this time, mainly men, however we have several women tenants as well. Our monthly rent for a single room is still under \$300, and that amount includes all utilities plus cable TV. All tenants must pay a deposit of \$130 plus first month's rent to move in.

There have been significant changes in our general area as St. Lukes/PCI have demolished buildings and are currently converting the vacant lots to a parking area. Margaret Bock Housing lives ON.
